Problem Solving & Bullying

This school year has been off to a great start for our students in SEL classes. This year our SEL lessons have focused on spending more time on topics to solidify student learning to the many different topics we discuss. So far this year our students have been learning how to navigate some difficult issues including problem solving & bullying.

Our lessons on problem solving included defining problems as something that causes us difficulty and makes us feel any number of unpleasant emotions, but can be solved to help students focus on solutions instead of just the problem in front of them. To help students focus on solutions we worked towards understanding problems as small, medium, or big and determining the appropriate responses to each problem size. These steps included practicing a calming skill to make sure we are doing our best thinking, coming up with lots of ideas in a brainstorm, and then thinking about which choice may be best (older students learned about making pros & cons lists to help think through choices).

Our lessons on bullying included learning to define bullying appropriately and how to be on the lookout for bullying behavior. To help understand the definition of bullying, students discussed the similarities and differences of bullying to mean moments and accidents. Students learned that in each of these situations there is a person who has been hurt in some way, but that differs in each situation. With accidents the person has been hurt unintentionally & that both students can respond with kindness & empathy. With mean moments the person has been hurt intentionally because another person was experiencing an unpleasant emotion or trying to process their emotions in an unhealthy way. Lastly, bullying differs from these as it's both intentional and there is a pattern to the behavior (it is happening over & over again). Older grades added to this definition by also discussing how in bullying scenarios there is uneven power and students discussed some examples including: strength/size, age/experiences, and popularity. Finally students learned about the many different ways bullying can occur and to be knowledgeable of other kinds of bullying besides physical bullying. Students also learned about verbal bullying (using words to do harm), social-emotional bullying (using relationships & friendships to do harm), & cyberbullying (using technology to do harm). Next lessons on bullying include discussing what it means to be a bystander versus an upstander.









Storm Rally & School Theme

The counseling department has enjoyed working with the Stormonth Way Committee to plan our monthly Stormonth Rallies! This year our school theme has been "Build yourself up. Build each other up." This theme highlights the importance of creating healthy and positive habits in ourselves which in turn help create a strong school community. To help reaffirm this theme the whole school has participated in two all-school read-alouds. In September, students read Jabari Tries and in October students read Bonaparte Falls Apart. Older students were able to share their thoughts on these stories and how they help build each other up in class to inspire our younger students. For our November Rally we brought in a special musical guest, Tony Memmel! Tony Memmel is a singer, songwriter, and motivational speaker who spreads the message of resilience and celebrating yourself. It was a great opportunity for our students to connect to our theme of this school year, "Build yourself up. Build each other up."
